Using Value Based Medicine to Improve Cardiovascular Outcomes for Blacks

The predominant model for patient care has been evidence-based medicine (EBM), which focuses on clinical decision-making based on the best available research evidence.^{1,2} This paradigm has evolved into value-based medicine (VBM), which starts with the best evidence-based data and incorporates value-based data using patient-perceived value associated with a treatment or intervention. The term “value-based” was first introduced by a team of researchers led by Dr. Brown at the Center for Value-Based Medicine at Pennsylvania State University.^{3,4} The goal of VBM is to promote higher quality patient care and more efficient use of healthcare resources than are conferred by EBM alone.

For a number of cardiovascular conditions, such as coronary heart disease, hypertension, and heart failure; and cardiovascular-related conditions such as diabetes, atrial fibrillation, peripheral artery disease (PAD), and coronary artery disease (CAD), black patients have higher risks and/or worse outcomes than do white patients. As new guidelines and innovative treatments are developed in cardiac care to improve treatment and outcomes, ensuring that these are applied to all populations is critical to population health. In this context, for patient groups most at risk, VBM can play a significant role in providing data transparency to address gaps in care by clinical practices and health systems. Many leaders addressing health equity believe VBM provides a means for improving care across all populations because of its data-driven premise to improve transparency of metrics.

We will offer a multi-sector seminar that addresses the evolving paradigm of VBM in care and its impact on improving health equity in cardiovascular conditions.
